Hitting the big 100k

N EW year, new landmark. Almost exactly nine years after production started at Triumph's Hinckley factory in January 1991, the 100,000th machine rolled off the production line in January of this year.

The machine, a Lucifer Orange Sprint RS, is destined for the Italian market, where Triumph distributor Numero Tre has plans to use it in a promotional role.

Annual production at the plant now stands at over 22,000 machines per year, with further expansion planned as the new Hinckley factory comes on stream over the next three years.

Wild thing

TAKE a look at something really wild! This is a supercharged four cylinder Triumph 1200 motor which is now housed in a hillclimb race car and produces 280 bhp running on methanol fuel.

It's the work of independent tuning specialist John Wilcox and has chalked up many victories over Formula One engined opposition in its two year history.

British-based Wilcox has also developed a range of tuning packages for Triumph motorcycle applications, including a

142 bhp upgrade kit for T595 and 955i models.

The kits include a modified cylinder head with larger valves and new Wilcox-produced camshafts and remachined pistons. A complete exhaust system, made to Wilcox's own specification in stainless steel, features tapered header pipes, balance pipes and a large bore three-into-one collector. It is supplied with a high level carbon race can.

Vernier cam pulleys allow accurate setting of the cam timing, while a modifier system enables corrections to the fuel and ignition settings to match the changes made to the engine.

The kits cost £1995 plus VAT, with an additional charge of £300 plus VAT if you want Wilcox to fit it to your bike.

Other Wilcox kits for Triumph engines include three stage tuning kits for the Thunderbird, Adventurer Legend and Tiger models, peaking in an output of 104 bhp (107 bhp for the Thunderbird Sport) and a 160 bhp conversion for models which produced 147 bhp in standard form (Daytona 1200 and early Trophy 1200s). A big bore 955cc conversion is also available for the Tiger.

For further information please see the Wilcox Competition Engines advertisement in Torque. It should be pointed out that the kits are not officially approved Triumph modifications and that any modification to your bike's engine from standard specification will invalidate your machine's warranty.




Busy time at British show

DESPITE slightly lower attendance figures at the 1999 UK International Motorcycle Show held at the NEC in Birmingham, Triumph had one of its busiest years to date. New models and updated stand livery ensured a continuous flow of Triumph fans and

first time visitors eager to catch sight of Triumph's latest model line-up.

"Interest in the TT600 and Sprint RS has been phenomenal, and we've been inundated with test ride requests," said UK sales and marketing manager Bruno Tagliaferri.

New 600s start to roll

PRODUCTION of Triumph's new TT600 supersports machine got underway in January, with the all-new four cylinder sportster scheduled to make its first appearance in Triumph dealers' showrooms towards the end of March.

Available in black and yellow and red and silver colour schemes, the 110PS machine is Triumph's first move into the competitive 600cc supersports class and reflects a massive commitment by the company.

Innovative features include the use of fuel injection managed by the class-leading Sagem MC1000 electronic engine management system, highly advanced piston design using a new temperature controlled forging process and a strong but lightweight aluminium perimeter beam frame which uses the engine as a structural member.

The machine has been displayed to the public at motorcycle exhibitions throughout the world since its launch at the International Motorcycle Show at Birmingham, England, in November and the response has been strong, with demand likely to be high as the riding season gets underway in the northern hemisphere.


Holland

Wild times in the Sierra Nort

Cabril



FIELD mushrooms soaked in olive oil and studded with red peppers. A plate piled high with succulent lamb chops or salty grilled pork cutlets. All washed down with local red wine. Rugged food for rugged country and just the sort of treats that lie in wait in the little known Sierra Norte, near Seville in southern Spain.

A designated 'Natural Park', the 'Northern Sierra' - to give it its anglicized name - sits on the eastern wing of the larger Sierra Morena. The rounded hills are swathed with woods and sliced through by numerous small rivers which over the centuries have carved a series of steep valleys.

The whole area teems with wildlife including wild cat, wild boar and deer. while domesticated black Iberian pigs nuzzle amongst the trees, silently developing the superb cured hams of which the region is justifiably proud.

This sparsely populated wild country is a magnet for walkers and mountain-bikers, but it should also be on the list of places to visit for the adventurous Triumph rider.

The climate makes year-round riding a real possibility, while the quiet, challenging roads are a treat.

Long stretches of fast, snaking, roller-coaster bends blend with tortuous mountain switchbacks and hairpins to provide hours of fun and a real test for even the most experienced rider. Add the fact that you are within easy reach of the Jerez race circuit and at the heart of beautiful historic Andalucia and the Sierra Norte becomes an ideal component in a tour of the region.

Following the advice of Seville Triumph dealer David Muniz we chose the Sierra Norte as the base for the European press launch of the Sprint RS in December. Leading a different group of journalists through the park every day proved an ideal way of getting to know the region - even if the weather did range from warm sunshine to thick fog and heavy rain over the week-long test period.

Our base for the tests was the ancient walled town of Carmona, 30 kilometres east of Seville. Carmona is a jewel. Thick, towering walls encircle the maze of narrow streets and lanes that were laid out in Roman times and even today the only access is through a handful of narrow gateways easily defended against marauding invaders.

At the heart of the old town lies the Parador - the old castle, now converted like many of its kind in Spain into a superb, atmospheric hotel. Perched on the lip of a dizzy precipice, the Parador boasts commanding views of the wide

flat floor of the Corbones valley known as the Vega - far below. No armed force stood a chance of sneaking up on this strongpoint.

Carmona lies about half an hour's ride south of the Sierra Norte. Skirt the Seville suburb of Brenes and head for Cantillana. An unlovely town in itself, Cantillana is the gateway to the Sierra Norte and just a couple of kilometres out of town, on the way north to El Pedroso, the road starts to twist and turn, dip and rise. For the next 35 kilometres the action is non-stop.

Hold the speed down the straight, snick the gearbox down a cog or two, heel into the turn and feed the power back in. The bends come at you one after another, some tighten up, demanding a wide entry and careful exit, others turn into long sweepers that make the most of the RS's rock steady handling and smooth power delivery.

Cross the bridge straddling the valley of the Viar river and you start to climb through a deep cutting in the brick red earth. Resist the temptation to back off and hold onto the throttle through the well surfaced sweeping bends and the wide, well surfaced road unrolls in your path. In a few minutes the crest is reached and you begin a helter-skelter descent through a sequence of quick but tricky off-camber downhill bends.

It's a breathtaking fairground ride that finally drops you, heart pounding and grinning like a fool, onto the long straight into El Pedroso and a muchneeded coffee stop.

El Pedroso looks like it's fallen straight out of a Clint Eastwood film. A small, sleepy collection of whitewashed buildings clustered around the local train station, it was buzzing the first day we passed through to check out the route. The annual food fair was taking place and the town was full of people and lined with cafes and shops displaying and selling local delicacies. For the rest of the week it was virtually abandoned, with just a few locals gathering together in one of the two cafes opposite the station which seemed to rotate their opening hours.

Now the road starts to toughen up.

Take a right in El Pedroso and follow the fork towards Constantina. After the sharp drop down to the single track bridge that crosses the Hueznar river the speed starts to pick up for the dash to Constantina and the rugged heart of the Sierra Norte.

The triangle formed by the towns of Constantina, Las Navas de la Concepcion and Alanis is the most unexplored part of the region, but it is also home to one of the best roads for motorcycle tourists.

From Constantina, ignore the road south to Lora del Rio. It looks like a main road on the map, but it's more like a moto cross track in reality. The road north to the regional capital of Cazalla de la Sierra isn't much better but the town itself is worth a visit. The town square is flanked by a pretty 14th century church and is also home to a busy restaurant that serves excellent local delicacies and spills out into the square when the sun is shining. (I dare you to try the pigs' cheeks soaked in olive oil!)

But instead of heading straight for Cazalla, pick your way carefully around the cobbled one-way system that weaves its way through the steep and narrow streets of Constantina and take the right turn to Las Navas as you leave the village. What lays ahead is an exhausting 22 kilometre stretch of mountain-style twists and turns – double that if you choose to retrace your steps back to Constantina once you reach the other end, which most people seem to do.

The most amazing thing about this road is the surface. It is new and perfect - even in the wet weather we experienced some days. Quite why this road from one small hill town to another received such VIP treatment is a mystery (one theory was that a local big-wig must own a motorcycle – we won't go into that!) but the result is there for all two-wheel fans to enjoy.

Much of the road runs through woodland, the semi stripped trunks of the cork trees being especially memorable, with superb vistas of deep wooded valleys and steep sided cliffs bursting into view from time to time.

Much, but not all, of the route is lined by metal Armco barriers, and the parts that aren't either lead to a steep drop or a rock wall, so it does demand respect, but get into your rhythm, relax and let the bike start to do the work and the result is motorcycling heaven. A road not to miss if you're ever in the area.

Another coffee in the Hostal de los Monteros in Las Navas and you are ready for a return blast to Constantina and perhaps on to Cazalla and the rest of the Sierra Norte before calling it a day and heading back to base.


Whichever route you choose, you are guaranteed some brilliant riding, some fantastic food and the confirmation that the best roads aren't always the best known.

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


We tented and cooked our own meals and experienced all types of weather – from extreme heat to torrential downpours and lightening storms.



So for my fellow women bikers out there who are reluctant to try the bigger more powerful bikes, I say "You go, girl!"



Parts supply

WHILE I agree that using official Triumph spare parts is the best policy when working on our bikes, what if the parts are not available from Triumph?

With reference to the section on testing the starter motor in the Triumph workshop manual for my '94 Trophy, the instructions are to change the brushes, brush plate or commutator if certain measurements are recorded, yet there are no parts numbers. Of course you can always buy a complete new starter motor!

What is Triumph's position on this?


HERE I am with my 50th birthday present in Manistee on the shores of Lake Michigan. After a 12 year hiatus from motorcycling it's great to be back!


Stand out from the crowd

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Megamania

An extra cylinder makes this Sprint something special. Alan Cathcart took a closer look.


PPEARANCES can be Adeceptive. Take this Sprint as an example. From a distance it appears to be a standard early model. But take a closer look. That black paintwork wasn't available at the time and isn't that a custom made four-into-one exhaust system snaking down the left hand side? And that engine looks much wider than an early series Triumph triple should do.

The answer lies in the neat sign-

written logo tucked away on the bike's tail end. This isn't a Sprint at all - it's the Megasprint!

The bike is the creation of Italian Triumph distributor Carlo Talamo and his engineering guru Alberto Poggi and is actually a hybrid of an early Sprint and a four-cylinder Daytona 1200.

The Daytona's engine, chassis and running gear are retained with the addition of a Sprint seat, fairing and handlebars and a specially made Italian







exhaust. The conversion is expertly carried out. In fact the only clue that it is a special is the gap between the fuel tank and the fairing that would be flush-fitting on an original 900.

The result is a machine that enjoys the best of both worlds. The Daytona's punchy power delivery is complemented by the upright, relaxed, semi-touring riding position, while the original machine's distinctive styling shows off the big four cylinder engine.

Finished in black and with the four-into-one exhaust growling away, it's every inch a serious musclebike.

On the road it's actually very relaxing to ride. The engine is docile below 5000 rpm and not a lot more demanding when the revs start to rise and the upright riding position gives a greater sense of being in control.

The meeting of Sprint and Daytona is a seductive combination, even if Triumph's production schedule meant it was one they weren't able to realise themselves at the time. But if you're looking for ideas for your own 'wolf in sheep's clothing' the Megasprint might provide just the inspiration you're seeking.

Ago's secret

Triumph

ACING hero Giacomo Agostini is Revorld famous for dominating the grand prix scene for a decade from the mid-sixties to mid-seventies, but few people know that Triumph played an important backroom role in his record breaking career.

The 15 times world champion never actually raced a bike from the British factory, but a road-going Trident helped him perfect his riding skills and master the relatively heavy multi-cylinder MV Agusta that he was racing in 1968 when the triple was introduced.

"During the early years of my career I spent many hours riding motorcycles away from the track as part of my training," he explained. "I needed to be on a bike as much as possible to develop the riding techniques that would help me beat the opposition on race day."

However, at that time the number of big bikes available in Italy was limited and he saw little of value to be gained from riding small capacity machines on the roads around his Northern Italian home near Brescia.

"I was under contract to an Italian company so there were some makes of motorcycles that I couldn't really be seen on," said Ago. "The ones that I could ride were all 125 or at best 250cc and their weight and performance characteristics bore no resemblance to those of the MV that I was racing."

Frustrated by the situation, Agostini turned his attention to the British market, and in particular Triumph.

"While I was racing in England I saw the three cylinder Triumph and decided

that it would be my ideal road bike," he said.

"I spoke to someone at the factory and arrangements were made for me to collect a Trident the next time I went to an English circuit."

A T150 was duly handed over to the Italian rider at Oulton Park. "It wasn't a gift, I had to pay for it, but at the right price," recalled Ago with a smile.

What happened after the hand-over proved too much for those in charge of editorial at Motor Cycle News at the

The delighted 'Mino' leapt aboard his new toy and produced a couple of high-speed demo laps without wearing a crash helmet. He was cheered on by his many fans who lined the Cheshire circuit, but it was frowns all round from the powers that be in charge of the meeting.

Alert top photographer of the time, Malcolm Carling, wasn't caught out by the unscheduled performance and snapped the Italian at speed with his hair blowing in the wind. The result of his quick thinking effort was however brushed aside when it arrived on the MCN subs desk.

"I have never been able to understand why it wasn't used, I considered it to be really newsworthy," commented the now-retired Malcolm.

Ago duly loaded the green tanked Trident into the MV transporter for the



trip back to Italy.

"I rode the Triumph a lot and there is no doubt that it was a great asset to me for the next five or six years while I was still racing for MV," said Agostini who claimed his first 350/500 championship double in 1968, to raise his tally of world titles to four.

The Trident still belongs to Ago



although it hasn't turned a wheel for the last ten years. It stands in the corner of the garage at his luxurious Lovere home on the banks of Lake d'Iseo, in what he describes as a "rather sorry state."

"But I am planning to have it renovated," he assures with haste. "I had trouble with the engine one day and never rode it again."

Whether Ago, now aged 57 and about to launch into a peak viewing TV programme as the 'expert' in a grand prix review presentation, will ever get astride the triple again is debatable.

"I am getting a little old now, but I used to enjoy riding the Triumph so much that I might be tempted to give it a run when the engine is fixed and it looks as good as new once again," said the man who won his last grand prix on a 500 MV at Nurburgring in 1976.

"That's a long time ago but I have remained involved with racing ever since, and that Trident still brings back happy memories of my championship years," he added.
