

# Regional runs to cover the country

RAT is coming your way in '99. As part of the continuous expansion of the club we will be organising a programme of regional runs covering the whole country.

We have split the UK into eight regions and will ensure that each region hosts at least one RAT Run during the season, giving all members easy access to club action, wherever they live.

The format of the runs will vary. Some will be a single day, others will offer the option to go riding on Saturday and Sunday, but each run will have set start, finish and rest points and feature an

interesting theme, destination or route.

There will be no charge for members to take part and there will be complimentary refreshments available on many runs. Some will be organised and hosted by the club's own management team, others will be run on behalf of the club by Triumph dealers.

"RAT Runs are designed to fill the gap between dealer pack outings and the major international events organised by the club," said International Club Manager Neil Webster. "They are the next stage of the club's development programme and will make it easier for all members to get more from the club.

"Members are free to attend any runs they wish and there will be no need to reserve a place unless specifically stated in Torque. You will be free to take part in the full run, to meet up with members at the rest point, or to ride in to join up at the finish point. It's up to you!"

The initial eight UK regions are the South West, South East, West Midlands, East Midlands, North West, North East, Scotland and Ireland, and it is hoped to sub-divide these into smaller units in coming years.

### Flying high

FOUR members of the Ideal Triumph Owners Club undertook a week-long round Britain fund raising marthon this Summer.

Starting out from a sunny Birmingham in July, their aim was to visit all of the Air Ambulance Stations in the UK over the next six days, raising funds for the Midlands Air Ambulance Trust in the process.

Their journey began with a visit to RAF Cosford, then it was on to Newquay, followed by a stop at Exeter Airport, all covered in the first day.

The route then took them across to London and Kent from where they headed north to the RAF base where the Lincoln Helicopter is situated. It was then over the Humber Bridge to Newcastle and on to Inverness, reached at the end of the fourth day.

The final stop was at the Glasgow Helicopter Station before heading back to Cosford and the start point of this epic run, where they were greeted by the first crew.

"Something not a lot of people realise is that Air Ambulance Helicopters are usually funded by public donations and not your Health Authority," said Paul Wood of the Ideal Triumph Owners Club.

"We covered 1828 miles in six days and raised £2000 for the trust. Not bad for a holiday jolly with four lads getting away on their bikes." he continued.

# **Track Action**

MEMBERS from all over the North of England lapped up the atmosphere at County Durham's famous Croft race circuit where the BMF held their Great Northern Bike Show in October.

Billed as an interactive event, the show included stunt displays, charity sidecar rides and mini motos, but the biggest attraction was the chance to ride on the circuit, with several club members making the most of the Autumn sunshine to put in some track time around Croft's sinuous curves.

After taking in the show's attractions or riding their bikes around the circuit, RAT members were provided with free refreshments and the chance to relax and chat with other Triumph owners in the club's own marquee.

Pack leader Dave Sims from Eddy's of Leeds led a ride-out of eleven bikes, which included an attention grabbing modified Speed Triple. "This is the first ride-out I've led, so with eleven bikes turning up I'm really pleased," said Dave.

Taking up the story is Jack Lilley Racing Team Manager Clive Wood:

"The year started with shakedown tests at Keevil - an aerodrome circuit - and they went without a hitch. The weather was dry, enabling Francis to put in some very quick laps. Much to the surprise of many, he was measurably the fastest rider out there. The team went back to the workshop feeling quietly confident.

The season kicked off with some typically consistent rides from Francis, with regular finishes in the top six, the best obviously yet to come.

As we moved into the season the competition was fierce, but at Donington Park in June Francis set a blistering pace in qualifying and gained pole position against a grid of Yamaha R1s and Honda Fireblades.

This achievement was quite a milestone as the Jack Lilley Racing T595 was the first Triumph to gain pole position in a British National race for over 20 years!

Two finishes in the top five at this meeting left Francis second in the series - highlighting his consistent form.

Donington is a track at which the team performs well. The set-up of the bike, Francis's riding style and the circuit's flowing bends proved to be a combination hard to beat. We were already looking forward to coming back later in the season.

As the season progressed, the pace seemed to be hotting up rather than settling down, as the Silverstone meeting proved. With initial qualifying held in the wet, Francis claimed a provisional pole position but drying tarmac saw him eventually qualify in fourth position for the race and he held this position to the flag.

With Francis now holding third in the championship there was still a great deal at stake. For the penultimate round, it was back to Donington where another pole was taken by Francis with a time of 1m 41.82s - good enough for a place on the grid in the British Superbike race held later the same day!

To confirm he is a force to be reckoned with he went on to win the race in convincing style.

With just one round left, we headed for Thruxton looking to finish the year off by taking second place in the championship. The win at Donington had put us equal on points to Yamaha's Dan Harris and set the scene for a nail-biting finale.

Unfortunately, this was not to happen. Complications ensued and Francis ended up not racing, leaving him fourth overall in the championship.

Despite this, the season has been fantastic for everyone involved. We have shown what the T595 is capable of and we're looking forward to 1999," concluded Clive.


Telling the story of the UK Motor Industry from 1896 to the present day, the Centre features around 200 exclusively British vehicles in a unique open-plan exhibition.


# Heritage Run

Hill. Many of the original
buildings have been
restored, where period
room settings recall the
atmosphere of those
heady days.

The Museum also has a collection of over 30 aircraft representing 80 years of aviation industry at Brooklands from A.V Roe's first flight to the design and production of Concorde. The unique collection of Vickers and Hawker aircraft includes 'R' for 'Robert', the



restored Wellington bomber rescued from Loch Ness in 1985.

The run is free for RAT members who will also enjoy complimentary refreshments.

Optional entry to the Brooklands Museum is £6 for adults, £5 for OAPs and students and £4 for children aged 16 and under.

The run will leave The Sammy Miller Museum at 11am.

# Coast to coast

'RIUMPH-MOUNTED adventurer Nick Sanders has done it again!

Building on the success of his global circumnavigation world record of 18,000 miles in 31 days aboard a first generation Daytona, Sanders attempted a new record of riding around the coast of Britain in five days or less.

To set a record for the 4802 mile meant averaging at least 850 miles every day so Nick made sure he had every chance to achieve this by using a brand new Daytona 955i collected at the RAT Summer Festival, in July.

Despite conducting a reconnaissance of the route prior to the record attempt, the journey actually took 9 days and 14 hours. "It would have been faster but the holiday traffic on the narrow lanes made it an impossible record breaking journey" said Nick.

To commemorate the trip. Sanders will be embarking on a video tour throughout the UK, visiting a selection of Triumph dealers during January, February and March where you can share his experiences on this epic trek.
